Philly allocated \$50 million in federal Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding to expand opportunities for youth, including after school programs



# Investment led to:

### For ASAP programs:

More students served by ASAP than before the pandemic

ASAP served 4.090 kids with ESSER

## For peer organizations: 2

- Expanded youth access to afterschool + summer programs
- 44% increased organizational capacity
- 44% served more students
- 38% expanded programs

Philly schools have the strongest academic recovery among large urban districts approaching pre-pandemic achievement faster than any other city's schools<sup>4</sup>
