Sabian, a 12th grader at West Philly High, was quick to confess he suffers from stage fright. So why then did he join his school's ASAP Drama club?

"Because I plan on being a doctor." — Sabian

Sabian understood doctors often have to deliver sad news to a patient or their loved ones. By learning and performing monologues he hoped to gain the ability to communicate clearly and calmly during these difficult moments.

Ceanni, on the other hand, isn't sure what she'll be when she grows up. For this 7th grader from North Philly, drama club is about showing people who she is now.

"Performing lets people see who I really am – without the shyness." — Ceanni

For Kiara, drama club served a different purpose. When cast in a bilingual musical, performing became less about connecting with the audience than with herself.

"I come from two different cultures. Drama's helped me get in touch with my African-American and my Spanish side at the same time." — Kiara, 8th grade
